Ed Balsdon is the Interim Dean of Graduate Studies at San Diego State University. He previously served as the Associate Dean of Graduate & Research Affairs 2015 – 2020, leading SDSU initiatives related to graduate student funding, success, diversity, enrollment management, accreditation, community outreach, and strategic planning for future graduate programs. His scholarly work specializing in natural resource economics, public finance, and behavioral responses to risk has appeared in Land Economics,

the Journal of Urban Economics, the National Tax Journal and other publications. He directed the SDSU Economics MA program 2006 – 2012 and was faculty in the American Economic Association (AEA) Summer Training Program 2008 – 2010. Ed joined the SDSU faculty in

2000 after earning a B.A. from College of the Holy Cross, an M.A. and Ph.D. from UC Santa Barbara, all in Economics.

Universities in the United States offer a vast and varied landscape of PhD programs in STEM fields and beyond. For generations, these programs have trained students from all over the world, as reflected in the international diversity of the American STEM workforce. This mini course is designed as a primer for international students interested in doctoral study in the U.S., and for those who support them. Major topics include: the admissions process, PhD program structure and differences with programs in the UK and Europe, funding opportunities and expectations, the F-1 visa, the role of faculty mentors, and professional development. The talk concludes with information about doctoral programs offered at San Diego State University.
